Description of proposal

The Maria Island Experience is a multiple night supported experience focused on the island's cultural values, wildlife and heritage. The experience, based in proximity to the heritage precinct of Darlington would involve building a sensitive roofed accommodation on a site removed from the Australian Convict Sites World Heritage Area at Darlington and within the existing visitor management zone.

The all-inclusive Maria Island Experience (MIE) would cater for small groups and be designed to appeal to both domestic and international visitors. It would also showcase Tasmania's wonderful food and wine offerings.

Guests would enjoy a variety of activities exploring the fascinating heritage of the World Heritage Precinct of Darlington; observing at close quarters the island's wildlife of wombats, kangaroos, geese and Tasmanian Devils; walking up to view the spectacular twin peaks of Bishop and Clerk or the more relaxed walking circuits of the Fossil Cliffs and Painted Cliffs. Activities would be limited to small group sizes.
